

Setting up...

















In no particular order (apologies if I missed anything)

Paint

- Quality above quantity (cool and warm of the primaries plus white)
- Williamsburg used by several artists
- St Petersburg Russian brand
- Winton (Winsor and Newton) a good standard for beginners
- Water mixable an ok option. Do not use water to thin the paint, as this can change the binding agent and lead to cracking use specialty mediums. Water for washing your brushes etc.

Palette

- Tempered gray glass palette good for mixing colours
- Old fridge shelves
- Card and grease proof paper (disposable)
- Look at the way different artists arrange colours on palette find one that works for you.
- Learn to mix your colours with a palette knife.
- Cover with pot lid to prevent drying out

Underpainting

- Use a neutral colour or any colour that works for you (purple)
- Thin layer even all over OR wipe back into the underpainting major shapes and light/dark areas.
- Underpainting can be acrylic DO NOT paint acrylic over oil
- Gesso and fine sanding if you want a smooth surface to paint on
- Seal (house variety) the canvas or board all round to prevent warping

Thin to thick paint - work thin layers of paint first (liquin is used by many to thin the paint and allow flow)

Fat over lean - Layer one - no medium (linseed etc) - final layer more medium

Brushes

- Hog hair allows for a good pick up of paint
- Synthetic details
- Fan or large soft brush for blending
- Try to stay away from small brushes for the first layer
- Long handle try not to hold the brush like a pencil
- Temu has cheap brushes
- Mall Stick to rest your arm when doing details
- Cleaning wipe clean and use soap (sunlight or da Vinci) or wipe clean and leave suspended in oil
- Try using different brush for separate colours
