Persistence gains recognition By Allan Horwell

WHEN it was suggested the Robert McDougall Art Gallery hold a retrospective exhibition of Peter McIntyre's works, staff members laughed.

McIntyre was born in Dunedin in 1910. He attended the prestigious Slade School of Art in London and was chosen as the official British artist during World War 2. During that time, he produced dozens of action scenes, ostensibly sketched in pen and ink. He also painted portraits of subjects chosen by General Freyberg. McIntyre was duly promoted to captain and his works were internationally acclaimed.

After the war, McIntyre returned to New Zealand where he married Pattie and the couple settled in Wellington. For the next 40 years McIntyre forged a living as an artist. In his homeland, however, his works were ignored by art aficionados and critics alike. Undaunted, McIntyre toured the country producing a series of impressive oil paintings capturing the essence of New Zealand and its people.

In 1964 the artist published a book illustrating his works. A former journalist, McIntyre also wrote the accompanying texts.

The book became a best seller remaining so for the following 20 years. This elevated his profile.

Several prizes in the Kelliher and eventually a first in 1959 coupled with a visit to Antarctica, cemented him as an artist of distinction.

McIntyre published eight books and was awarded the OBE in 1970. He died in 1995, aged 85.
