SMALL PAINTINGS DEDICATED TO BIG NAMES NADIA CURNOW

'En plein air'

John Singer Sargent's oil painting "An Out-of-Doors Study" (1889) features the artist Paul Helleu relaxing with his wife, Alice. It shows how painting **en plein air** allowed painters to



bring a new degree of intimacy and informality to their work, capturing their daily lives or those of their friends. The painting is part of the Brooklyn Museum's collection.

Alice Neel uncovered

A young woman sits in a comfortable chair. It's apparent however she is preoccupied. Something is troubling her. Behind the rubber plant is a dark portrait of an impish elderly woman with eyes like black opals.

Perhaps the answer to this puzzling work can be discovered by uncovering the preferences of the artist herself.

Alice Neel preferred to choose her sitters. Lunch or tea was usually served. Neel would invite her sitter to pose nude and sit on a specific chair. Before painting began, Neel regaled the sitter with lewd stories. She thought this relaxed the sitter and exposed their personality.

Neel was born in Pennsylvania in 1900. She lived with her husband in Cuba for several years before having a nervous breakdown in 1930.

In 1959 she starred in "Pull My Daisy" with Jack Kerouac and Allen Ginsberg. After completing a portrait of feminist, Kate Millett the work appeared on the cover of Time Magazine in 1970.

In 1974 a retrospective of her art was displayed at the Whitney Museum of American Art. Neel died in New York City in 1984.
