Notes from our gathering July 6th

## WATERCOLOUR

### **Paints**

Pans or tubes - majority favoured tubes and filling palette Art spectrum palette was popular

### **Pans**

- Cheaper pans are often opaque and don't offer the beautiful transparency of watercolour. Brands tried included Mungyo.
- Medium priced pans a good option for budget conscious. Brands tried included Reubens, Van Gogh, Talens.
- High priced pans pure pigment and transparency.
   Brands tried included Daniel Smith, W&N
   Professional, Schminck, Sennelier; A.Gallo

### **Tubes**

• Brands - QoR, Van Gogh and Daniel Smith Consider getting just 8 colours - rather than a big set - warm red, blue, yellow - cool red, blue, yellow, sienna, opera pink (popular buy might not be light fast)

### **Paper**

- Know the difference between hot and cold press paper.
- Try out different brands arches, etchr,
- Use workbooks to experiment and create colour swatches
- Try buying a 'block' of watercolour paper, as you don't need to tape it down
- Use masking tape around all sides to tape paper to a hard surface
- Use a sponge or wide brush with a small amount of water to wipe both sides of paper to remove excess size
- 100% cotton paper

- Experiment with small pieces of different paper to find your favourite
- Rough v smooth
- Weight of paper aim for at least 300lb or 600gsm

   thick and sturdy, resists warping well, but can be
   more expensive.
- Hot press paper has the smoothest surface. It has almost no tooth, allowing you to achieve vivid, brighter colors and apply glazes with ease. Generally, hot press papers are popular for painters who are interested in achieving very fine details such as botanical illustrations.
- Cold press paper has a slightly bumpy surface
  texture with a bit of tooth to better absorb the
  paint. It is the most popular type of watercolor paper
  on the market, and it allows for a variety of different
  watercolor techniques. To make cold pressed paper,
  manufacturers press the paper's fibers together with
  felt rollers at a cold temperature. Those felt rollers,
  which have a subtle texture of their own, create
  those slightly bumpy lines in the finished product.

#### **Brushes**

- Aim for brushes that are able to hold a good amount of water.
- Start with large brush avoid using a small brush at the start of your painting

Use a spritz bottle of water to activate your colours. Make sure you use enough pigment. Aim to create a range of values (photograph your paintings in black and white to see if there are a range of values). Work flat or upright depending on how you want the paint to react. Try using a permanent ink pen to draw in your subject matter. Try using water soluble coloured pencil to draw in your subject matter. Work light to dark
